### To Continue a Classic

Famed author Harper Lee will publish her first novel in 55 years

To Kill a Mockingbird will not be author Harper Lee's only published novel after all. After more than five decades, Lee's second book, Go Set a Watchman, will be released on July 14, publishing imprint Harper announced on Tuesday. "This is a remarkable literary event," said publisher Jonathan Burnham. "The existence of Go Set a Watchman was unknown until recently, and its discovery is an extraordinary gift to the many readers and fans of To Kill a Mockingbird."

The news of Lee's new novel immediately created plenty of buzz—and sales. As of Wednesday, pre-orders of Watchman held the Number 1 position on Barnes and Noble and Amazon's websites, more than five months ahead of its release date.

# NEWS

## Hour of Code

In mid-December, all students at PCS got to participate in the "Hour of Code," sponsored by Code.org. Through playing games, students were actually writing computer code. For many students, this was their first time exposed to the world of computer science. In fact, millions of students all over the world were doing the same thing throughout Computer Science in Education Week.

Launched in 2013, Code.org® is a non-profit dedicated to expanding participation in computer science by making it available in more schools, and increasing participation by women and underrepresented students of color. Their vision is that every student in every school should have the opportunity to learn computer science. They believe computer science and computer programming should be part of the core curriculum in education, alongside other science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) courses, such as biology, physics, chemistry and algebra.

### Code cont...

PCS students wrote code in Java script, a widely used computer programming language. But the way it is done, they didn't even realize they were doing it. The games were fun, some of them a lot like Angry Birds. Each skill level that the student achieved opened up more complex skills levels.

Mr. Terry Keeley spearheaded the Hour of Code. He also had student "docents" who helped other students figure out how to play the games. In the elementary building, Mrs. Tilley helped students learn the games.

Teaching students about code opens up new worlds to many of them, a career field that they might not otherwise have been aware of.

Perhaps some PCS students will become programmers because they had the opportunity to take part in the Hour of Code.

## The Beginning of Celebrating the New Year

Celebrating the New Year goes back 4000 years ago, but it didn't begin in western cultures until only 400 years ago. The holiday began in ancient Babylonia (now Iraq) around 2000 B.C. However, the Babylonians began their new year near the end of what is now March, a logical time to start a new year since winter was over, spring with its new life was beginning and crops were planted for the coming year.

In 153 B.C. the Roman senate decreed the New Year to begin on January 1. It made this decree to correct the calendar, which had become out of synch with the sun. The date has no agricultural or seasonal significance.

The Acceptance of the New Year's Celebration:

Although January 1 had no agricultural or seasonal significance, it did have a civil one. On that date the newly elected Roman consuls would step into their positions. Interestingly, the month of January is named for the Roman god Janus, who had two faces, which can represent looking back at the old year and one looking forward to the new one.

### New Year's cont...

Celebrating the new year was a pagan practice and for that reason, the early Christian church condemned it. However, in order to more easily convert pagans to Christianity, the Church accepted the celebration on January 1, but made it the Feast of Christ's Circumcision.

### New Year's Resolutions:

Making resolutions on New Year's is as old as the holiday itself. The Babylonians would make resolutions, the most popular one being to return farm equipment! The ancient Romans also made resolutions for the new year, their most popular one being to ask for forgiveness from their enemies.

The Anglo-Saxons, who settled what is England, had a festival called Yule, which celebrated a fertile and peaceful season. The boar was a part of this celebration and people would make solemn "boar oaths" for the coming year.

### Customs:

Although the day designated as the day the New Year begins may differ from culture to culture, it is a time the world over for celebrating. There are so many different customs that it is impossible to list them all, but here are some of them:

### Germany

Small pieces of lead are melted in a spoon over a lit candle. The melted lead is dropped into cold water. It hardens into shapes, which predict the future. A heart or ring shape, for example, means a wedding.

### Greece

A gold or silver coin is baked into a cake. The person who has the piece of cake with the coin inside will be lucky for the rest of the year.

### Japan

Before the holiday, houses must be cleaned, inside and out. At midnight on New Year's Eve, a monk at a local shrine strikes a gong to signify the forgiving of the past year's mistakes.

### Netherlands


To purge the old year and welcome in the new one, the Dutch make bonfires in the street out of their Christmas trees.

### Scotland

Firstfooting-people visit neighbors just after midnight to wish them well for the new year. It is considered good luck if the first person to step foot into your house is a tall, dark and handsome man!

Eating twelve grapes at midnight on New Year's Eve will bring twelve months of happiness.

Meal Control Settings - Parents can select "meals only" and/or "ala carte" meals for their students.

## What Students Should Know about Flu

Your head aches, and so does every muscle in your body. You're cold one minute and hot the next. Your throat is scratchy and you're starting to cough. You might be coming down with the flu! Flu Season is October to May. If you get the flu, you'll have lots of company. Each year from October to May, millions of people all across the United States come down with the flu. Kids get the flu most often. But people in every age group — including teens — can catch it.

What Is the Flu? Flu is the common name for influenza. It's a virus that infects the respiratory system. Often when you're sick with a virus, your body builds up a defense system by making antibodies against it. That means you usually don't get that particular virus strain again. Unfortunately, flu viruses mutate (change) each year. So you aren't protected from getting the flu forever. Some years the change in the flu virus is slight. So if you do get the flu, it's mild. The antibodies from having the flu before give you partial protection. But every 10 years or so the flu virus goes through a major change and many people get severe cases. These large-scale outbreaks are called epidemics.

## Flu cont...

If they spread worldwide, they're called pandemics. The H1N1 ("swine flu") outbreak of 2009-2010 was considered a pandemic.

How Does the Flu Spread? The flu virus spreads through the air when a person who has the virus sneezes, coughs, or speaks. The flu can sometimes be passed on through objects that someone with the virus touched, sneezed, or coughed on. When a healthy person touches these contaminated items and then touches his or her mouth or nose, the virus can enter their system.

People carrying the virus can be contagious 1 day before their symptoms appear and about 5 to 7 days after they first get symptoms. So it's possible to pass the flu on before you even know you're sick.

Flu epidemics often start in schools and then move quickly through a community as students spread the virus to family members and people around them.

How Do I Know if I Have the Flu? Flu symptoms appear anywhere from 1 to 4 days after a person has been exposed to the virus. The main symptoms of flu are: headache, sore throat, fever, chills, muscle aches, stuffy nose, dry cough. Someone with the flu may have a high fever — for example, that person's temperature may be around 104°F (40°C). People with the flu often feel achy and extra tired. They may lose their appetites.

The fever and aches usually disappear within a few days, but the sore throat, cough, stuffy nose, and tiredness may continue for a week or more. In addition, the flu can sometimes cause vomiting, abdominal pain, and diarrhea. If you have only vomiting and diarrhea without the other flu symptoms, you probably have gastroenteritis. Though some kinds of gastroenteritis are known as "stomach flu," they're not the same as seasonal flu. Some gastrointestinal infections are caused by non-flu viruses or bacteria.

Although you may feel miserable if you get the flu, it's unlikely to be serious. It's rare that healthy teens have complications from the flu. Older adults (over age 65), young kids (under age 5), and people with chronic medical conditions are more likely to become seriously ill with the flu.

**Top Things to Know About the Flu**

- Although you may feel yucky if you get the flu, it's unlikely to be serious.
- Getting a flu vaccine is the best way to protect against the flu. Washing your hands a lot helps too!
- Don't take aspirin if you think you have the flu.


